Review of team theory

A crucial step toward successful innovation is forming the right team to pursue each opportunity. Practice getting this right by drawing lines below to connect each scenario in the first column to the type of team in the second column that is the best match for it.

Scenario	Type of Team
1. A school wants to disrupt the traditional classroom model by creating a studio where students set individual learning goals, teachers seldom lecture, the learning space is flexible, and students move on as soon as they demonstrate mastery.	a. Functional team made of up teachers within the department
2. Algebra I teachers want to flip their classrooms to allow students to watch the lectures from their devices at home and then do practice problems and projects during class.	b. Lightweight team with a manager who shuttles back and forth between the various groups to coordinate
3. Fifth grade teachers want to work with the school's media specialists to oversee a computer lab in connection with a Lab Rotation program.	c. Heavyweight team whose members co-locate, leave behind their departmental interests, and have a senior manager with significant authority at the helm
4. A school wants to change the bell schedule and redesign the use of physical space in order to convert all the classrooms in a middle school into a Station Rotation model for core subjects.	d. Autonomous team with authority to redesign budget, staffing plans, curriculum, and facilities
